Through the years, Jean enjoyed singing, painting, skiing, swimming and playing tennis. She also did volunteer work raising spirits by visiting people in the hospital who were ill.

"I also served on the board of the Whitefish Bay Women's Club and volunteered with Meals on Wheels," explains Jean. "Bill volunteered his time at St. Monica helping in the chapel operations, assisted with Meals on Wheels and was a member of the Rotary Club."

Jean and Bill also loved to travel! "We traveled around the world for four years with Bill's job at AT&T," says Jean.

The family owned a home in Door County where they spent their summer months. And Mary also enjoyed cooking and sewing.

"One day, my husband found a large aluminum fishing boat for sale," Mary explains. "It was just what he wanted with a nice deep hull, safe for fishing with young boys. He did have to remodel parts of it but that was the fun part. He'd take the boys down to his shop on Saturday mornings to remodel it together. They named the boat 'The ARK.""

That boat led the way to several others. To hold them all, Bradley built a large storage barn that's still standing today!

Mary says her year and a half at the Milwaukee Catholic Home has been very pleasant. "The staff has been outstanding, and I'd love to know their secret to remembering names! She also enjoys going to Flatley's for a glass of wine to meet fellow residents. "It's always a fun place to watch the Packers, Brewers or Warriors," she con-












